Ecological Footprint and Ecological Overshoot

Ecological Footprint for Sustainable Living in Japan

Ecological Footprint = Measure of how much natural resources we use in comparison to the availability of these resources.

Ecological overshoot = human demand exceeds the regenerative capacity of a natural ecosystem (overconsumption)

Global overshoot = humanity demands more than what the biosphere can renew. In other words, when humanity's **Ecological Footprint** exceeds what the planet can regenerate

We deal with deficit by liquidating stocks of resources and accumulating waste, primarily carbon dioxide in the atmosphere = pollution and climate change

A prolonged pattern of overconsumption leads to the eventual loss of resource bases

How many Earths do we need?

On Earth Overshoot Day 2021 (July 29) it took 1.7 planet Earths to meet human demand and avoid running a deficit on our ecological resources for the year.



How is it possible for humanity to consume as much ecological resources as if we lived on 1.7 planets?





Country	Number of Earths
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



On Easter Sunday, the rubbish will be removed, and the cross covered with flowers to signify the Resurrection, new life and the hope we have in Jesus.


During lent as a congregation we are aiming to reduce our waste.





10 things you can do to protect creation

Calculate your carbon footprint.

Understanding which activities are carbon-intensive allows you to know where you can take action.

Be energy efficient. During the summer, close your curtains to block heat from the sun. During the winter, open your curtains during the day to allow the sun to warm your home. When you're not at home, turn your thermostat down. These simple steps can significantly reduce the need for air conditioning and heating, which are likely the most energy-intensive aspects of your home.

Switch to renewable energy. Contact your utility for "green" options. Most utilities allow their customers to switch to 100% renewable energy for a nominal fee.

Adjust your driving routine. By carpooling or combining multiple errands in one trip, you reduce the amount of fossil fuel you use.

Go meatless on Fridays. According to the EPA, livestock production accounts for 9% of Americans' greenhouse gas emissions. By going meatless one day per week, you'll both honor Catholic teaching and better care for creation.

Reuse & recycle. Landfills emit greenhouse gases through decomposition while manufacturing goods from scratch is carbon-intensive. Find where and how to recycle almost anything in your area at search.earth911.com.

Use less water. Water processing is energy-intensive. Post a "please conserve water" sign at sinks and showers, install low-flow spigots and faucets, and select the "eco" setting on laundry machines and dishwashers.

Petition policy makers. Your elected officials have the power to take action on climate change. Encourage them to care for creation and the poor.

Write to your local newspaper. Writing a letter to the editor has effects beyond your local community. Local and national legislators see letters to the editor as important barometers of constituents' interest.

Form a study or action group at church. We are all strengthened when we act together. Consider forming a Creation Care Team—visit CatholicClimateCovenant.org to learn more.
